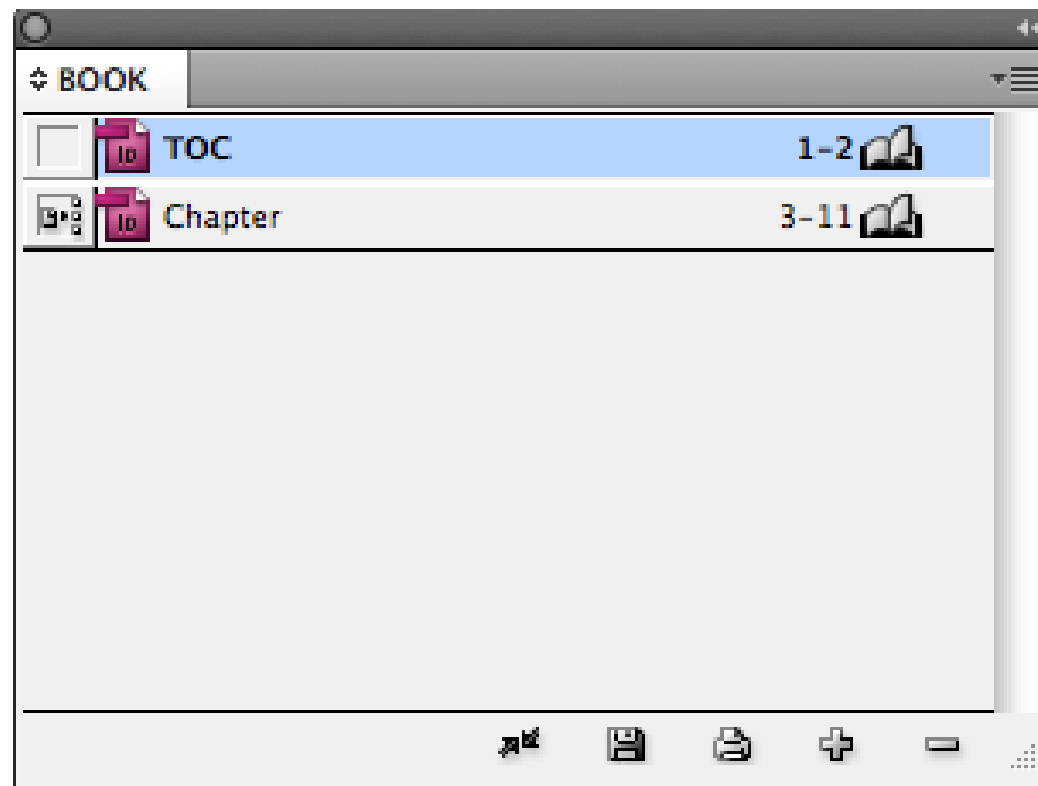

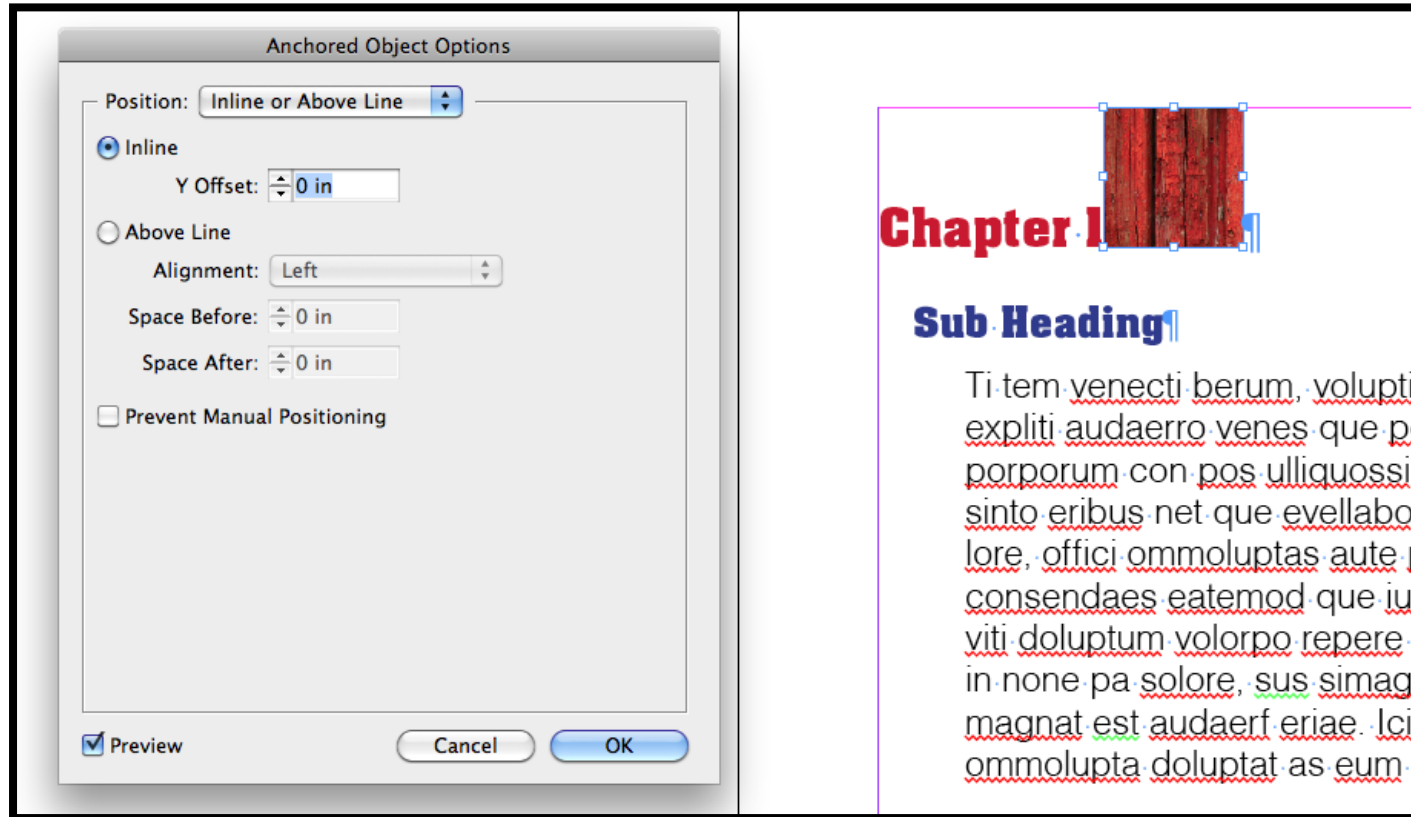
Set up your Chapter file, TOC file and book file.



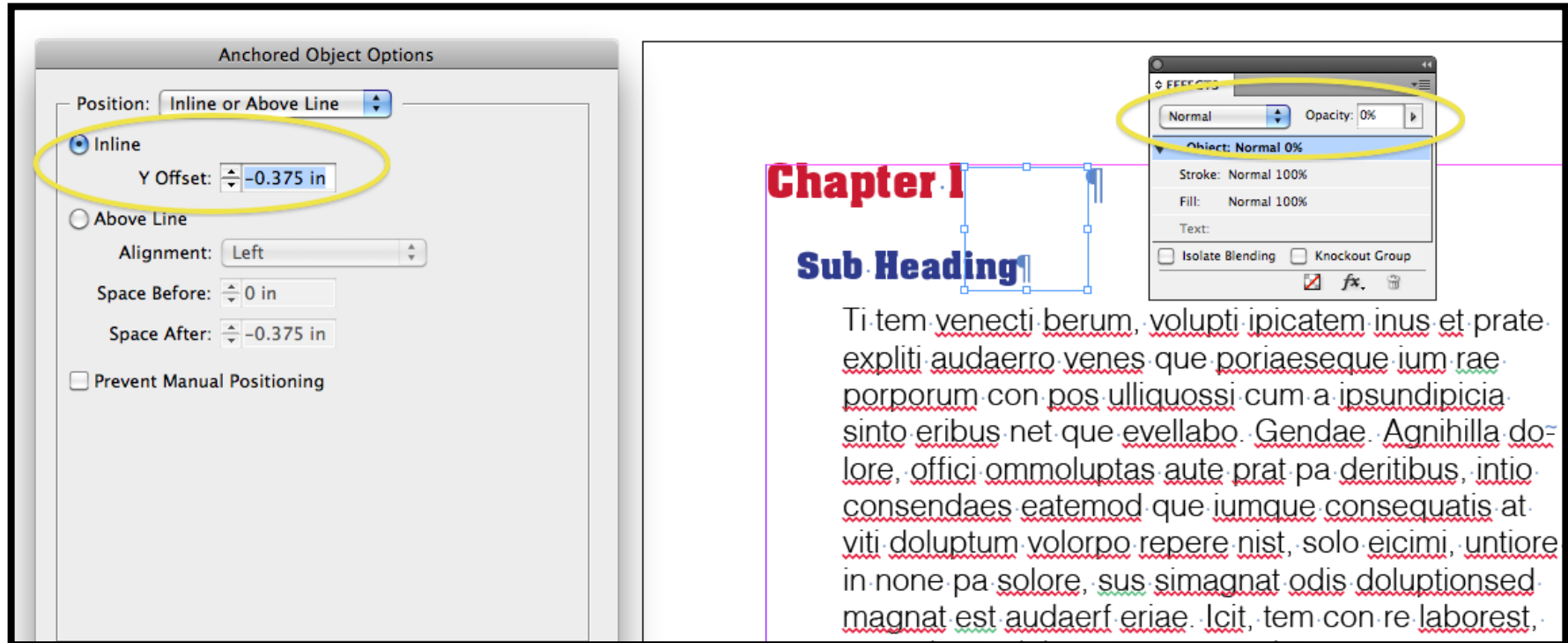
Make a TOC.

Add your thumbnail images to the headings in your chapter file.



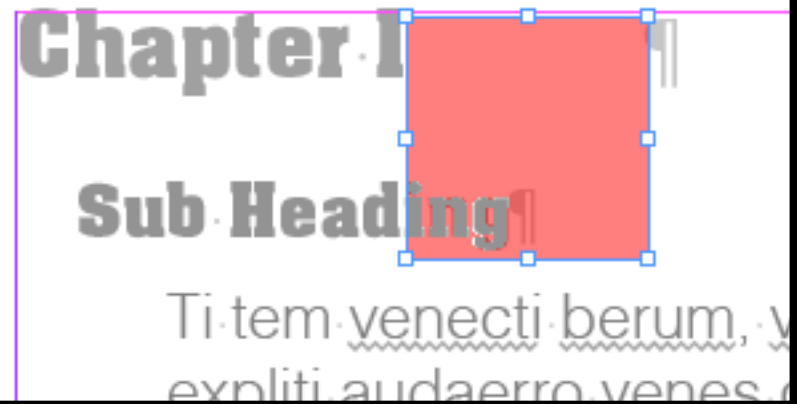
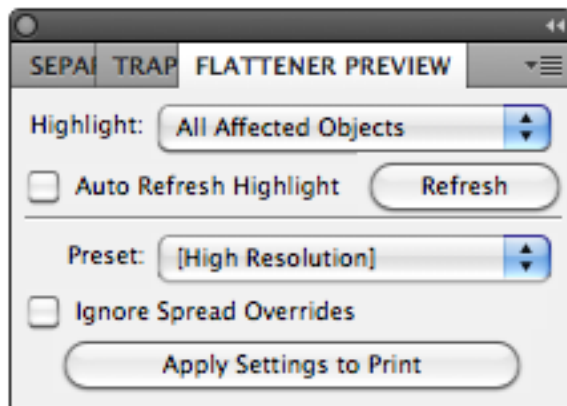
Format the first thumbnail image...



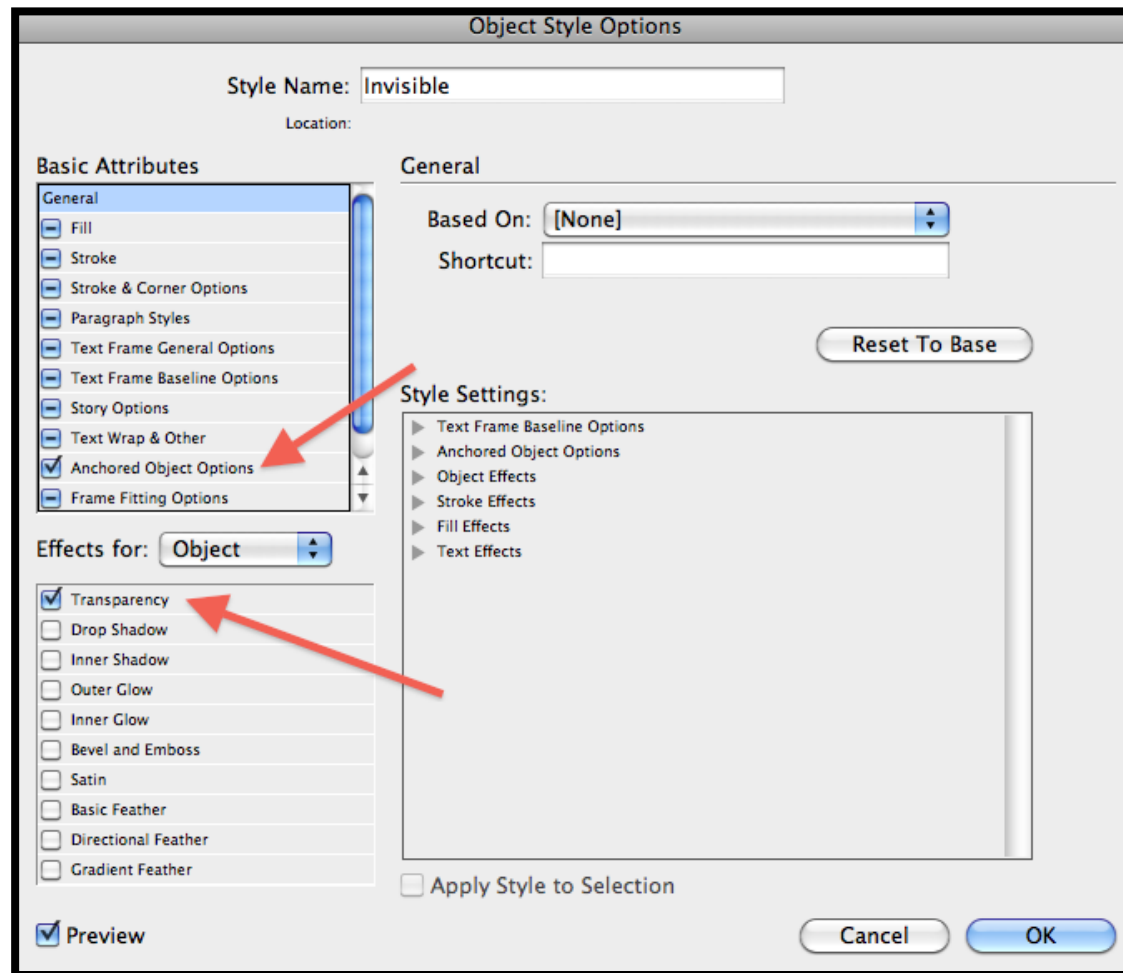
...so that it is invisible and doesn't push the text down from the top of the frame.



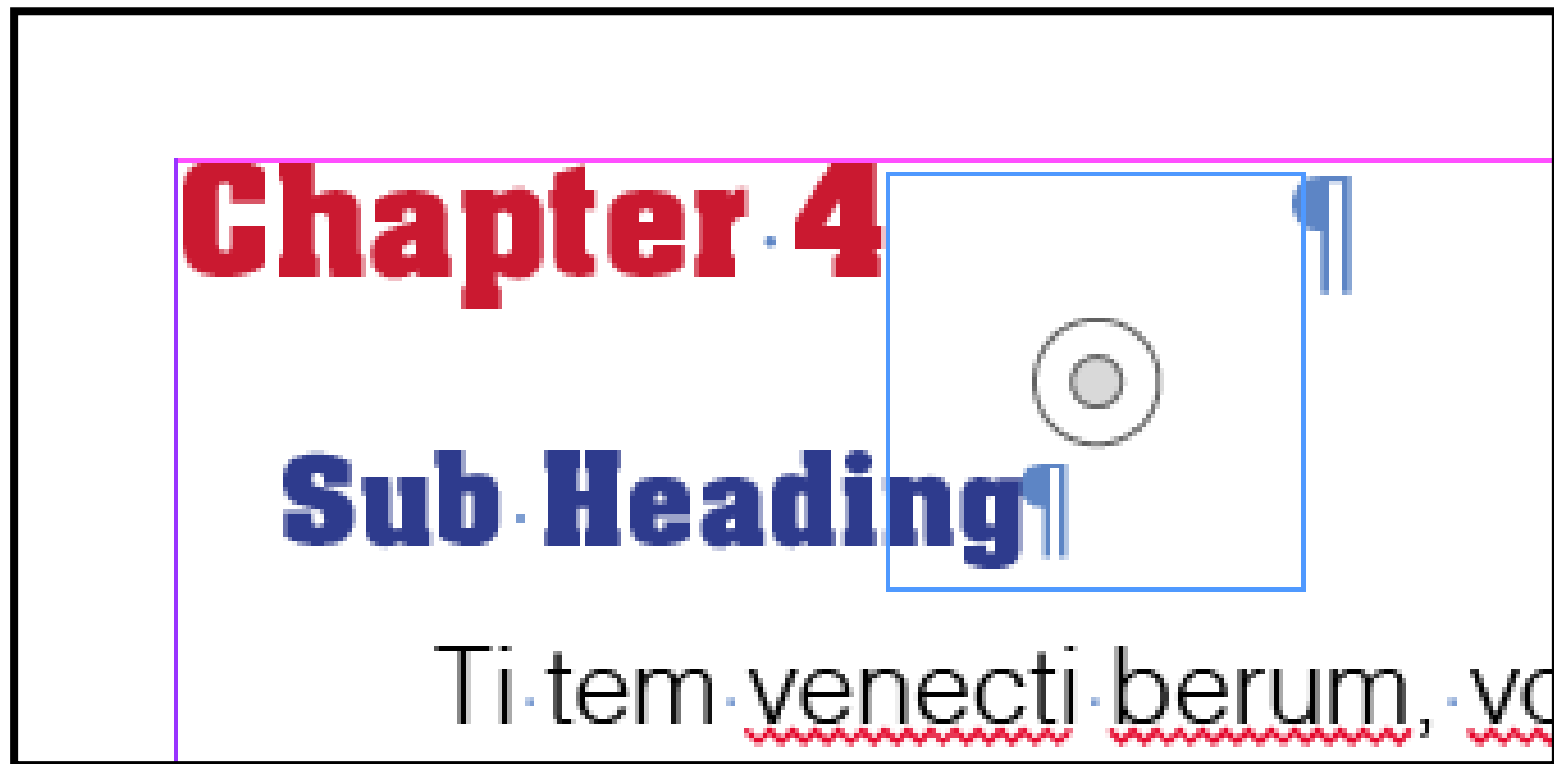
**Don't worry prepress
people, it's okay.**



Create an Object style for your invisible thumbnail.



**Apply this new object style
to all of the thumbnail
images in your chapter.**

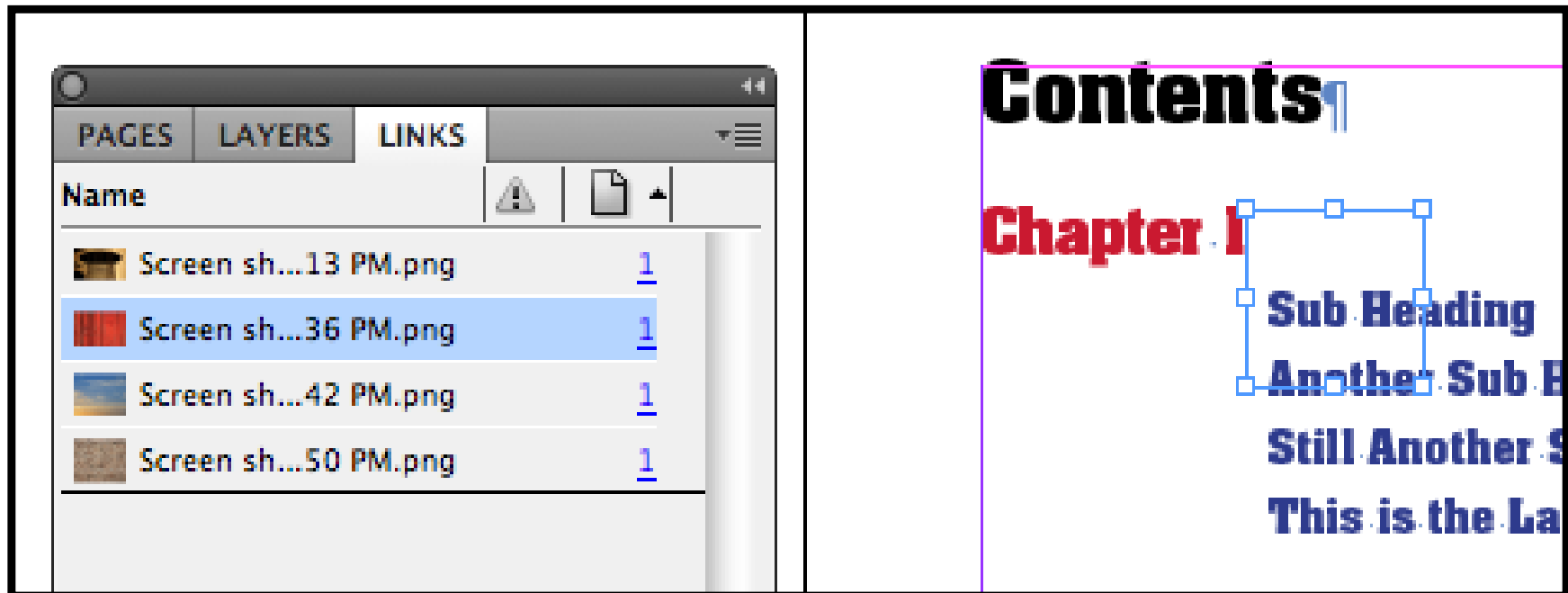


In your TOC file, update your Table of Contents.

A few of things just happened.

1. The TOC get updated.
2. The inline graphics pulled in along with the text.
3. The TOC file imported the “Invisible” object style you created in your chapter file.

Verify that your inline graphics pulled in.



Format one of the thumbnails to the transparency and position that you want all the final thumbnails to have.

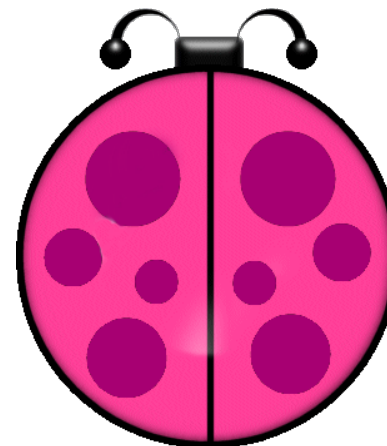
**Create an object style

This step is very important.

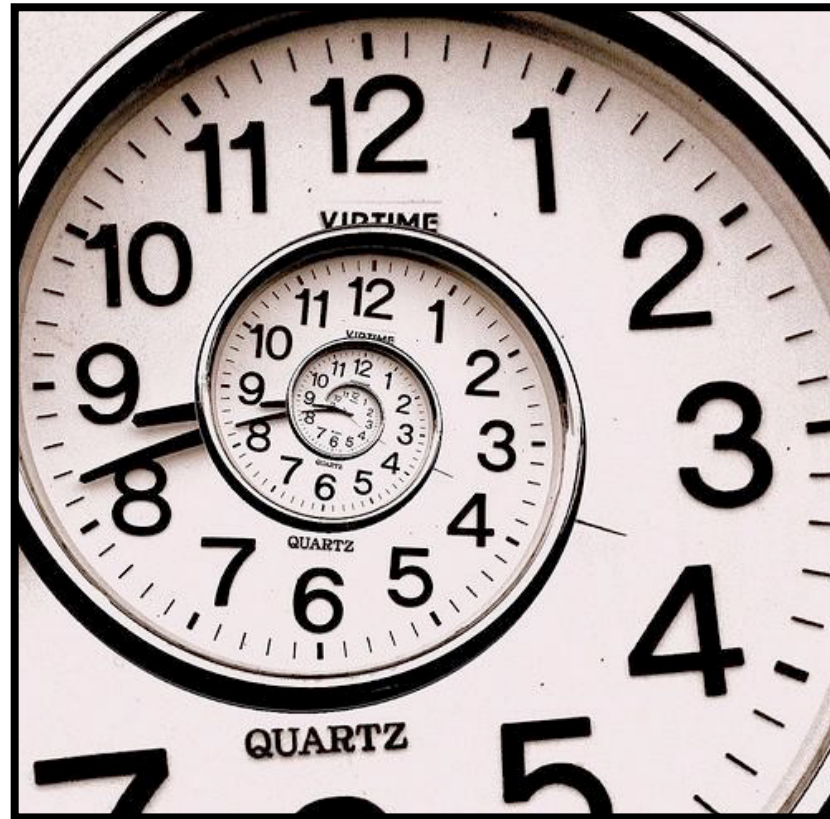
**Why not

and have **different** Object Style **settings**
for the chapter and the TOC?**

Because, there is a bug in InDesign...





It is at this point that I got stalled for about two years, trying to solve the problem.

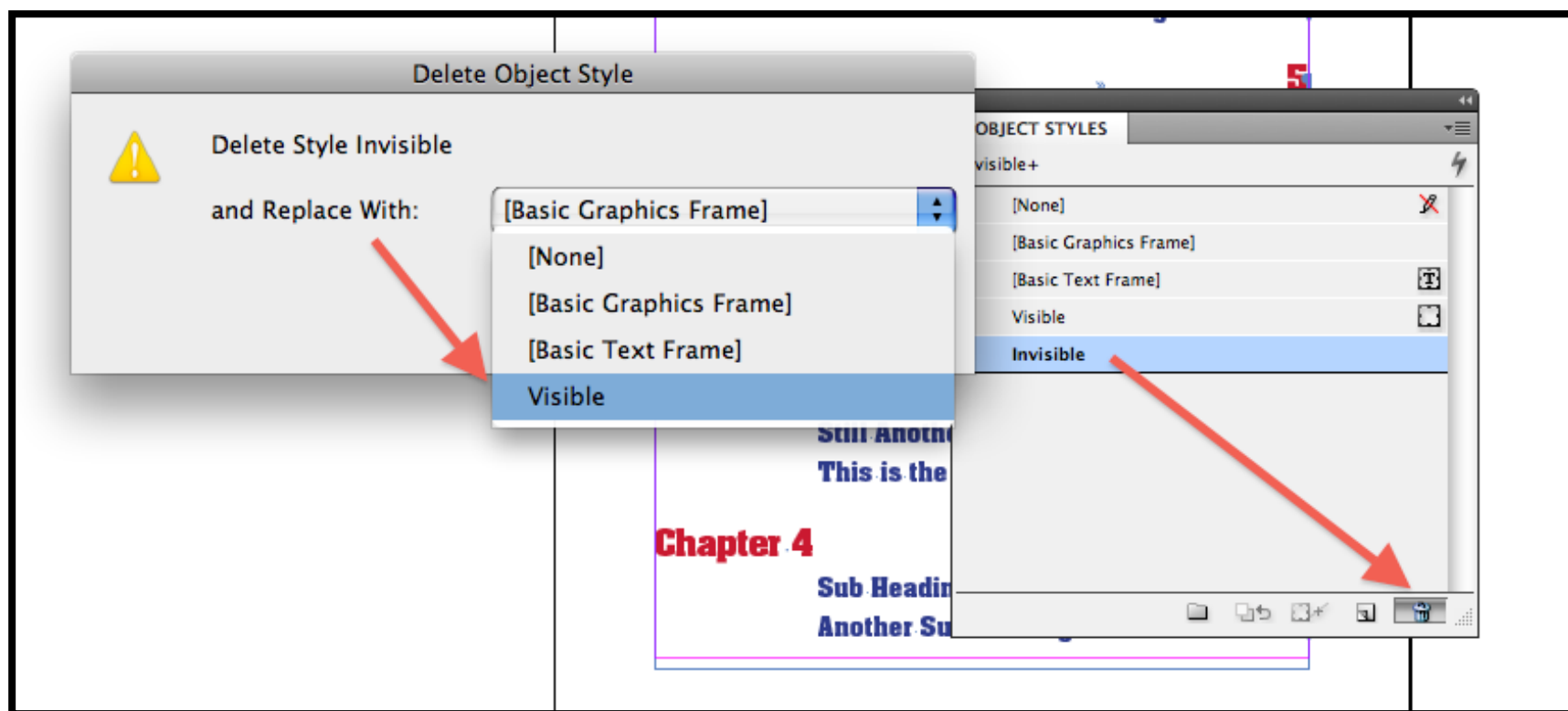




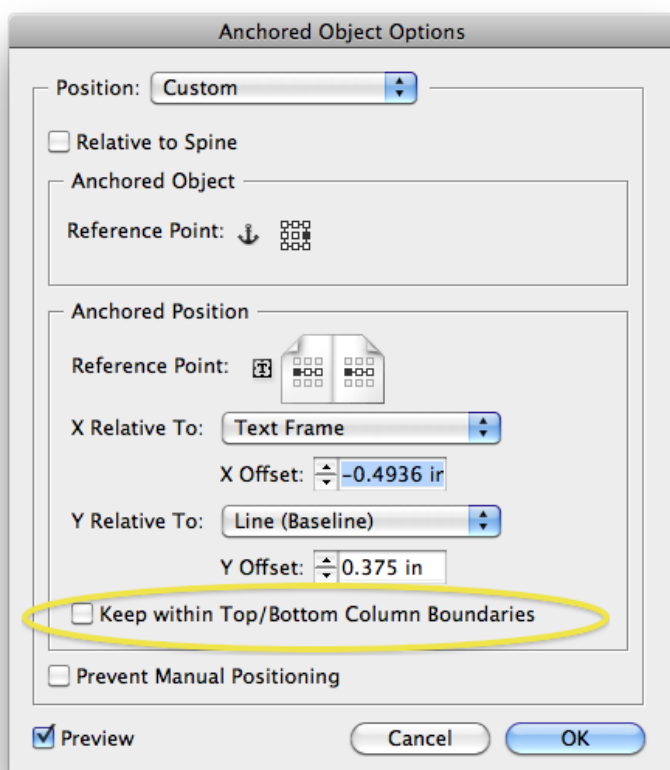
**The object style you pull in
with the inline objects in
MUST NOT already exist
in the TOC.**





**If it does, InDesign will crash.
Every time.**

Drag your “Invisible” style into the Trash.
